Course Description

Exploring Perugia is an interdisciplinary course that focuses on achieving a basic level in cultural and linguistic-communicative competences (speaking, writing, reading and comprehension) regarding familiar contexts, everyday life activities and simple interaction with native speakers. At the same time, it introduces students to various, relevant aspects of contemporary Perugian life and Italian culture, asking them to reflect on their own experience of immersion in a different cultural environment. This course has three pillars: language, culture, and reflection. Basic Italian language instruction is at the core of the class. Students will learn fundamentals of the Italian language in order to interact with Italians in various real-world settings. Second, they will use their language learning as a vehicle for delving into the richness and complexity of Italian culture. Third, students reflect on their experiences living in a new culture and understanding how this has impacted their perspective on the United States and their sense of their own identities. Through engaging in interactive assignments, maintaining a reflective course journal, and participating in group activities, students will learn to live in their new environment, build competence and confidence as global citizens, and understand how they can leverage their Perugia experience for their future personal and professional success.

Course Purpose

Students will acquire basic skills in speaking and understanding Italian, study Italian culture and experience it first-hand, and reflect on what they have learned both about Italy, the United States, and themselves through their study abroad experience. This course is the equivalent of a standard first semester college level Italian course in the United States.

Course Learning Objectives

At the end of the semester, students will be able to:

1. Demonstrate foundational skills in speaking and understanding Italian, including:

- a. *recognizing* and using words and expressions of daily and common use;
- b. *participating in* conversations at a basic level in everyday situations (talking about oneself, asking information, giving and receiving instructions, shopping, reading notices, etc.);
- c. *understanding* short texts (menus, signs, announcements, timetables, notices, recipes, short newspaper articles, etc.);
- d. composing short passages about their daily lives and direct experiences.
- 2. Participate in discussions of contemporary Italian culture.
- 3. Engage in critical evaluation of their own culture, Italian culture, and other foreign cultures, including:
 - a. *articulating* U.S. cultural rules, norms and biases;
 - b. *understanding* how their own experiences have shaped their values and priorities;
 - c. *knowing* how to respond productively to cultural differences;
 - d. *valuing* what is important to members of another culture, including their history, politics, communication styles, economy, beliefs and social practices;
 - e. *interpreting* cross-cultural experiences from multiple worldviews and *respecting* the rights and feelings of other cultural groups;
 - f. *asking* complex questions about their own culture and other cultures, *seeking out* answers to those questions that reflect multiple cultural perspectives.
- 4. Understand and articulate the unique benefits of their study abroad experience and anticipate how to leverage those benefits for their future personal and professional success.

Assessments

Final grades will be based on the following:

Participation (10%)

Class participation grades are based on oral contributions to the collective learning experience of the class. Participation means active engagement in the course: being consistently prepared for class having carefully read the assigned readings, asking questions, responding to questions, listening attentively to others, and offering your own insights and opinions.

Participation at Co-curricular Cultural Events (10%)

One of the great advantages students have in studying in Perugia is to live Italian culture in an authentic context. All co-curricular events indicated on the syllabus are obligatory, unless they are marked as optional. While not required to do so, students in Italian 101 are encouraged to attend the Tandem language exchanges to make connections with local university students and exchange viewpoints and perspectives.

Online exercises (8%)

Each week will include Moodle links to self-correcting online exercises. You may repeat these exercises as often as you want. Clicking on these exercises will mark them as completed.

Caffè culturale (8%)

At the end of each Unit, the *caffe culturale* asks you to dig a bit deeper into Italian culture. Oftentimes they include a prompt in English, which asks you to reflect on cultural differences. These short (1 page) activities must be turned in via Moodle and are worth 5% of your final grade.

Videocorso (8%)

At the end of each Unit, the *Videocorso* reinforces new vocabulary and grammatical concepts through a fun, continuing series of videos that are available with and without subtitles. The short (1 page) accompanying activities must be completed and turned in via Moodle.

Reflection Journal (16%)

Each week, students will be asked to practice simple linguistic tasks and reflact upon their cultural experiences in a reflection journal. These journals will be turned in twice – once at the end of week 5 and once at the end of the course. Each week's assignment counts for 2% of the final grade. Monday mornings, students will have time to share their reflections with their classmates during their Italian lesson, so they must bring their journals to class.

Online Quizzes (10%)

There are several graded online quizzes on Moodle, which you may retake as often as you wish/need in order to reinforce vocabulary and key grammatical concepts

Midterm and Final Exams (15% each)

The midterm exam will assess student mastery of course content during the first half of the semester and the final exam will be cumulative of the entire semester. In addition to a written component, each exam will include an oral component that will assess students' language competency.

Attendance Policy

Absences for Covid-related circumstances: in order to keep the entire Umbra community healthy and to comply with local laws, you may not enter the Umbra premises if you have a temperature of 37.5 °C (99.5 °F) or higher. We also ask students that display strong cold or flu-like symptoms to take proper precautions and not risk spreading any type of illness. Students may attend classes remotely and without academic penalty via Zoom in case of self-isolation or illness during

the Fall 2021 semester.

Class attendance (in person or through live connection) is mandatory. Students are allowed four "free" absences, which do not need to be justified. However, it is considered common courtesy to inform the instructor of your absence when possible. It is the students' responsibility to keep them in case of real necessity (sickness or any other unforeseen inconvenience that may prevent students from being in class). Each additional absence, unless for a very serious reason, will lower the students' grade by one grade level (i.e., a final grade of a B+ would be lowered to a B). If students miss class, they are responsible for obtaining class notes from other students and/or for meeting the professor during office hours. It is also the policy of the Institute that any student who has eight or more absences automatically fails the class.

Except in the case of medical emergencies, absences are not accepted when tests are scheduled; tests cannot be made up. Furthermore, scheduled times and dates indicated for exams, quizzes, oral presentations, and any other graded assignments cannot be changed for any reason. Even if more sections of the same class are activated, students may only take exams during the scheduled times and dates for the section they are enrolled in.

Academic Integrity

All forms of cheating (i.e., copying during exam either from a fellow student or making unauthorized use of notes) and plagiarism (i.e., presenting the ideas or words of another person for academic evaluation without acknowledging the source) will be handled according to the Institute Academic Policy, which can be found in the Umbra Institute Academic Policies and Conduct Guidelines.
